Happy New Year!

Despite all that's happening in the world (and there's always something going on out there that impacts us), it is in our DNA to look forward to a new year. Things will be different, things will change, stuff will happen – this is all inevitable. Fingers-crossed, prayers said, hopefully, touch wood, with luck, and God willing – 2022 will offer us the light at the end of a long, somewhat dark tunnel. Riviera has always been and has remained the light within that darkness - a place where we continue to

come together to worship and share fellowship, whether virtually, in person or in a mixed-up version. We greet and see each other and have a common bond in the refreshing and uplifting spirit that is Riviera Presbyterian Church. We carry that spirit with us into 2022 whatever happens!

Your Clerk of Session sneaked a peek at a previous January 'The Spark' newsletter which covered January 6 being the Epiphany of the Lord. I'm not a lifelong Presbyterian ,and even after reading the article, I still didn't have a good understanding. However, the internet did (listening to Rosemary and Anna on Sunday 1/2 also helped). Here's some information all from Wikipedia:

Epiphany (/əþɪfəni/ ə-PIF-ə-nee), also known as Theophany in the east, is a Christian feast day that celebrates the revelation (theophany) of God incarnate as Jesus Christ. ..In many Western Christian Churches, the eve of the feast is celebrated as Twelfth Night (Epiphany Eve).

Why is Epiphany celebrated 12 days after Christmas?

Christians believe that the 12 days of Christmas mark the amount of time it took after the birth of Jesus for the magi, or wise men, to travel to Bethlehem for the Epiphany when they recognized him as the son of God.

How is the Feast of the Epiphany celebrated?

The epiphany feast completes the season of Christmas by inviting us to discern the identity of the Christ child. Three traditions—baking a kings' cake, marking a door lintel with the magi's blessing, and elaborating worship with lighted candles—help us interpret the Christmas season appropriately.

King Cake. King cake is eaten on January 6 in honor of Epiphany, or Twelfth Night, which historically marks the arrival of the three wise men/kings in Bethlehem who delivered gifts to the baby Jesus. (The plastic baby hidden inside king cakes today is a nod to this story.)

Marking Doors. Either on Twelfth Night (5 January), the twelfth day of Christmastide and eve of the feast of the Epiphany, or on Epiphany Day (6 January) itself, many Christians (including Anglicans, Lutherans, Methodists, Presbyterians and Roman Catholics, among others) write on their doors with chalk in a pattern such as **20**  $\square$  **C**  $\square$  **M**  $\square$  **B**  $\square$  **21**, with the numbers referring "to the calendar year (20 and 21, for instance, for this year, 2021); the crosses stand for Christ; and the letters have a two-fold significance: C, M and B are the initials for the traditional names of the Magi (Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar), but they are also an abbreviation of the Latin blessing Christus mansionem benedicat, which means, May Christ bless this house. "Another form, for Three Kings day, is to mark the door with **IIIK** (the Roman numeral three followed by "K" for "Kings").

Elaborating worship with lighted candles. No explanation needed here!

I don't know if this information is helpful. I do remember eating King Cake when we lived in Houston, Texas. Very strange to see a little pink plastic baby baked in a cake. Let's move along.

Watching Morning Joe and listening to the Reverend Al Sharpton, I was reminded that the first day of January is the last day of Kwanzaa - a celebration of **community, family and culture** within the African-American community. There is something 'celebrated,' either religious or secular, on each and every day in January. I've mentioned two: Epiphany and the end of Kwanzaa. The first day of January is also the anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. Additionally, there's National Science Fiction Day January 2 (I like that one); Orthodox Christmas January 7; Korean American Day January 13; World Religion Day January 15; Martin Luther King's Birthday January 17; Roe V. Wade January 22, National Pie Day January 23 (yum!); International Holocaust Remembrance Day January 27; National Lego Day January 28; and National Croissant Day (another yum and I skipped National Chocolate Cake Day on January 27!).

I've digressed a lot. Let's just celebrate being together whether on zoom or not at church on Sunday, committee meetings, Sunday schools and more. And, since this is written after January 2, many thanks for resuming and participating in Holy Grounds online.

#### **Youth Sunday School at Riviera**


Covid continues to be a challenge to everyone feeling comfortable, getting back together in the church, and our maintaining a consistent program for our Youth. Riviera recently announced inperson worship for a limited number of vaccinated people in the sanctuary, while also having a live worship service available to all on Zoom, and afterward recorded on YouTube.

For Riviera and for me, Anna E. Rosas, Youth Education & Outreach Assistant, the safety of our youth is paramount when considering resuming regular Youth Sunday School and other youth activities; and we know and understand many parents decide to stay home. The Children's Sermon is an integral and consistent presence in Riviera's worship service. After the Children's Sermon, instead of leaving the sanctuary for traditional Sunday school, an activity will be arranged at the back tables in the Sanctuary for all children. In-person Sunday school will resume when it is safe to do so.

Beginning in February, Riviera will deliver an activity bag to each child. February's activity bag will focus primarily on Lent but also recognizes ♥ Valentine's Day! Subsequent activity bags will be delivered for: April (Easter and Pentecost); July (Summer and back to school); and October (Fall/Winter holidays).

Our Sunday Youth Reading Group continues on Zoom every Sunday at 4 p.m. The current book is **A Wrinkle in Time** and we're somewhere in Chapter 3 - Join us!
