### Where Do You See God In Your Life?

When we think of God, we sometimes envision a white-robed figure hovering above us. Ever observant and yet seemingly far removed. An imposing figure who expects only the best. This was my image of God while I was growing up. During church services, pastors gave impassionate sermons on the importance of pleasing God and giving a long laundry list of do's and don't's. In my young mind, God was a stage director who ran the show which we called life.

As I've gotten older, my views of God have changed significantly. I don't really see him as a far removed and distant figure. More of an entity. An invisible and ever-present force in everyday life.

With all the chaos and hardship the world has been living through, it wouldn't come as any surprise to question if God really knows what he's doing. Admittedly, I had constantly asked why allow the suffering of so many. Patients dying alone in ICU wards of an unrelenting virus. Children mercilessly gunned down at schools. Black civilians targeted without warrant at the hands of the police. Fires and storms ravaging our planet. It's easier to take the cynic's route than being an optimist.

Fred Rogers— everyone's favorite neighbor and ordained minister—was never short of comforting messages and pieces of advice. Arguably his most beloved nugget of wisdom was from his mother: When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.' This quote is reinforced by the phrase tikkun olam, which in Hebrew translates to repair the world.

It's easy to overlook the helpers of the world. What's even better is how anyone one of us can become a helper. During these two years, I have had a greater appreciation for small gestures of kindness. Whether it's an offer to help pick up groceries, a phone call, or a simple hug, they carry an even deeper meaning. And it is in these acts—big or small—that God is ever-present and never distant.

Years ago, a well-known professor at Miami Dade College was battling ALS. I saw him a few times and had never taken any of his courses. One day, I saw him leaving and quickly crossed the street. It hurt having to see him wheelchair-bound with little time left. I said hello, offered my support, and wished him



the absolute best. He smiled and replied, "You have the face of an angel." I have never forgotten his kind words. In hindsight, I'd like to think the Holy Spirit had a had to play in my act of kindness that day. It's what God intended. For us to be his helpers and healers.

April, the month of showers, Earth Day, Lent, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter! Easter – a solemn church holy time on one hand, and a day of bunnies, Easter eggs and candy on the other!

We are all saddened by the tragedy continuing to unfold in Ukraine since February 24. Why can't we do more? The questioning is endless. But, we can and will continue to remember the Ukrainian people in our prayers – espe-

Ukrainian people in our prayers – especially now during this special Lenten and Easter season for which the Ukrainians have so many wonderful and beautiful traditions. Once such tradition is Psyanky – the art of Ukrainian Easter egg decorating. The egg, call pysanka, pictured above is an example of this tradition. A <u>Ukrainian Easter egg</u> is decorated with <u>Ukrainian folk designs using a wax-resist method</u>. The word *pysanka* comes from the verb *pysaty*, "to write" or "to inscribe," as the designs are not painted on, but written (inscribed) with <u>beeswax</u>.

Many other Central and Eastern European ethnic groups decorate eggs using the wax-resist method for <u>Easter</u>. The traditional folk designs all have meanings so that the final decorated egg loosely holds a message, e.g. of prosperity, good harvests, love, etc. Decorating the egg is a laborious process starting with a plain white egg which is dyed in multiple colors from light yellows, pinks and greens to the darker colors of red, blues and black. After each dye, melted beeswax is applied on the egg with a stylus creating various designs on each color. At the end, the egg is completely covered in beeswax which is then carefully wiped-melted off to reveal the final, decorated egg.

Riviera will be distributing pre-decorated papers that you can wrap around your own eggs and bring to decorate (and show off). You'll be able to get the papers at church on Sunday. For those who would like to decorate and/or dye eggs together:



- Property To ensure the church buildings and grounds are well maintained.
- Finance To oversee the church's finances and communicate to Session.

This past month the Property portion of the committee was very busy. A list of repairs were identified and the proper persons were hired to accomplish them when the tasks was not able to be accomplished by our wonderful custodian, Mary, who also over saw the repairs with her keen eye for detail.

Here are a few projects that were accomplished in March:

- Acoustic ceiling tiles in the NW Entrance to the sanctuary were replaced.
- New well was made for the sanctuary ac system.
- Well trenches were covered and a protective border was installed to prevent pipe damage by large machinery.
- Gate was repaired in fenced area for Fellowship Hall and Church Library ac units.
- Repaired broken water pipe by mango tree.
- Sliding panels were installed and painted for easy access to future organ tunings and repairs.
- Kitchen light fixtures & cracked light panels were replaced due to age and not working efficient lights and new lay in ceiling light panels were replaced.
- Broken light fixture in the hallway was replaced.
